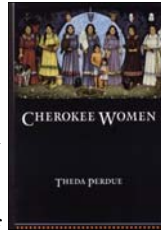

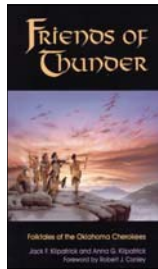

 252 pages \$15.95



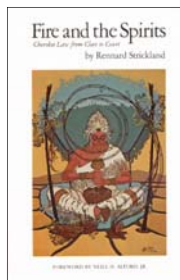

This Cherokee husband and wife team recorded and transcribed these folk tales in 1961. They helped to preserve the lore of seventeen elder Oklahoma Cherokees. This volume includes a wide variety of folklore: talking-animal stories, tales of a dragon-like creature and other monsters, accounts of little people inhabiting the hills of eastern Oklahoma, variants of European tales, fragments of Cherokee mythology and cosmology, and legends and lore of historical personages and events. The authors present the stories exactly as they were told, adding brief comments to place the stories clearly in the context of Cherokee life and thought. Musical notations are included wherever a song formed part of a story.

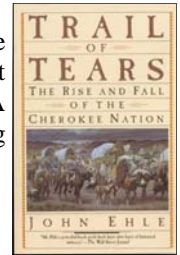
Fire and the Spirits

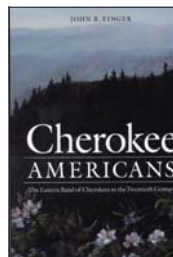
This book traces the emergence of the Cherokee system of laws from the ancient spirit decrees to the fusion of the tribal law ways with Anglo-American law. The author provides a brief review of Cherokee history and explains the circumstances surrounding the stages of development of the legal system. Of particular interest is a series of charts explaining the complex Cherokee spirit system of crimes (or "deviations") and the punishments meted out for them.

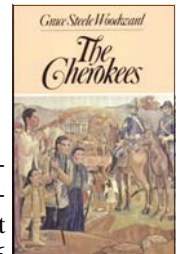


Cherokee Americans

Much has been written about the forced removal of thousands of Cherokee Indians to present-day Oklahoma in the 1830's. Many of them died on the Trail of Tears. But until recently historians have largely ignored the tribal remnant that avoided removal and remained in North Carolina. This book shifts attention to the Eastern Bank of Cherokees, descended from that remnant and now numbering almost ten thousand, most of whom live on a reservation adjacent to Great Smoky Mountain National Park. Ironically, this is the first comprehensive account of the twentieth-century experience of a band that is known to and photographed by millions of tourists.

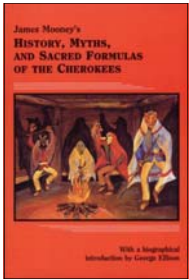
Of the Five Civilized Tribes of Indians the Cherokees were early recognized as the greatest and the most civilized. Between 1540 and 1906 they reached a higher peak of civilization than any other North American tribe. They invented a syllabary and developed an intricate government. They published their own newspaper in both Cherokee and English and became noted orators and statesmen. At the beginning their conquest of civilization was slow and uncertain. War lords of the southern Appalachian Highlands, they were loath to expend their energies elsewhere. But, led or driven, they were forced by circumstances to transfer their concentration on war to problems posed by the white man. They had to turn from the conquests of war to the conquest of civilization. A well-written and absorbing book.

History, Myth's and Sacred Formulas of the Cherokees

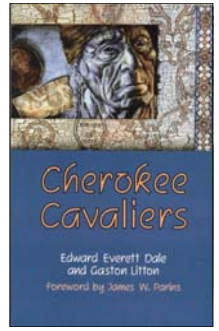

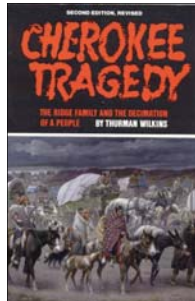
Cherokee Cavaliers

The 200 letters in this volume chronicle more than forty years of history in the old Cherokee Nation - from removal through the Civil War to Reconstruction - as recorded in the correspondence of the Ridge-Watie-Boudinot families. The minority leaders in the Nation, they were better known as the "Treaty Party." In 1835 they agreed to removal of the Cherokee Nation westward to Indian Territory. As a consequence the family leaders were assassinated by the opposing faction under Chief John Ross. Here, arranged in sequence with annotation and chapter introductions by the authors, are the lives and thoughts of such proud cavaliers of Cherokee blood as John Rollin Ridge, Stand Watie, and E.C. Boudinot.

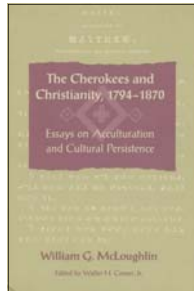


Cherokee Tragedy

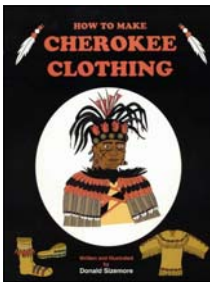


The Cherokees and Christianity, 1794-'870

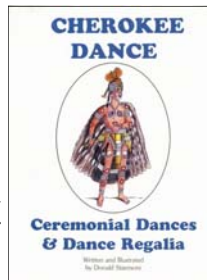

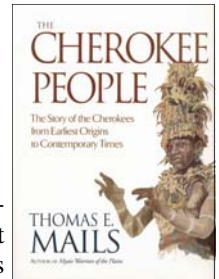
